

# 2021 Louis Rosenberg Award winner... Frank Bialystok!

We are delighted to announce that the 2021 Louis Rosenberg Award is being awarded to our dear colleague and friend Frank Bialystok.

Frank is a senior scholar of Canadian Jewish studies who has been



committed to Holocaust scholarship and education for over four decades. His groundbreaking study, *Delayed Impact*, altered the course of Holocaust studies in Canada and ushered in a new age of study in the field. He has mentored a generation of scholars in the field and has been a dedicated and generous supporter of the ACJS for many years. He is an outstanding scholar, community activist, and a *mentsch*. Congratulations, Frank!

### Message du président



### **Seymour Mayne**

### A Sheaf of Ottawa Poems

For a number of years, chiefly in various locations and homes on the east bank of the Canal, a group of writers, almost all in one way or another associated with the University of Ottawa, have been meeting and sharing their writings with one another. Seymour Mayne prepared a sheaf of poems from this writers' circle for the fall 2020 issue of *Pratik: A Magazine of Contemporary Writing* (Kathmandu, New Delhi).

This is a sampling from five poets, each writing in a unique style and voice: Shai Ben-Shalom, Nicola Vulpe, Betty Warrington-Kearsley, Erwin Wiens, and the editor. Their work is also underlined by a commitment to craft and a desire, as well, to have their words reach out so they are shared and heard by others, even faraway readers distant in geography but not in the universal devotion to poetry.

### Noted Los Angeles poetry magazine *Shirim* publishes Lavton double issue

At the invitation of Marc Dworkin, the editor of *Shirim*, the longest flourishing magazine of Jewish poetry in English, Professor Seymour Mayne prepared a double issue of Irving Layton's poetry with the permission of the late poet's publisher. Given the focus of *Shirim*, Mayne concentrated on editing an issue devoted to the poet's work on Jewish themes and subjects. He is often compared to his mentor and friend, the poet A. M. Klein (1909-1972), but few have noted Layton's body of work devoted to engaging Jewish concerns.

His Jewish poems, so central to his body of work, definitely hold attention today when antisemitism, morphed into new recrudescence, assaults Jews, Judaism, and Israel with an offensive vehemence.

Irving Layton, one of Canada's major poets, passed away in early 2006 at the age of 93. He published little in his later years, and his last books included a selection of poetry published in 1991 and a new edition of his selected poems released in 2004. However, an important edition of his prose, including literary manifestos, prefaces, articles and short fiction that was edited by a devoted scholar of his life and work, was not taken up by Canadian publishers and never saw the light



of print. No scholarly attention has been given in recent decades to his voluminous literary correspondence that remains preserved in many archives and fonds in Canada and elsewhere. And to date no one has tackled the key project of preparing a Complete Poems that would join other canonical editions in Canadian letters. This issue of Shirim is also aimed at rekindling interest in his major body of work.


**Ira Robinson.** A Kabbalist in Montreal: The Life and Times of Rabbi Yudel Rosenberg. Touro University Press, February 2021. 313 pp. ISBN: 9781644695036 (hardcover)

This book illuminates important issues faced by Orthodox Judaism in the modern era by relating the life and times of Rabbi Yudel Rosenberg (1859–1935). In presenting Yudel Rosenberg's rabbinic activities, this book aims to show that Jewish Orthodoxy could serve as an agent of modernity no less than its opponents. Yudel Rosenberg's considerable literary output demonstrates that the line between "secular" and "traditional" literature was not always sharp and distinct. Rabbi Rosenberg's kabbalistic works shed light on the revival

of Kabbala study in the 20th century.

Yudel Rosenberg's career in Canada will serve as a counter-example to the often-expressed idea that Hasidism exercised no significant influence on the development of American Judaism at the turn of the 20th century.

Ira Robinson is chair in Quebec and Canadian Jewish Studies in the Department of Religions and Cultures at Concordia University,



Montreal, Quebec, where has taught since 1979. He has written, edited and translated 17 books, including *Cyrus Adler: Selected Letters*, which won the Kenneth Smilen Award for Judaica non-fiction; *Renewing Our Days: Montreal Jews in the Twentieth Century*, which won a Toronto Jewish Book Award; and, most recently, *Les Juifs Hassidiques de Montréal* (2019). He is president of the Canadian Society for Jewish Studies and past president of the Association for Canadian Jewish Studies and the Jewish Public Library of Montreal.

He is the 2013 winner of the Louis Rosenberg Canadian Jewish Studies Distinguished Service Award of the Association for Canadian Jewish Studies.

Jewish Historical Society of Southern Alberta

It has been a busy winter for JHSSA, with ever-evolving pandemic work conditions and still-limited office hours.

Our Zoom programming continues to be well received and attended, and we have expanded our "reach" to include a mini-series co-hosted with Calgary Hadassah-WIZO. We were also pleased to be invited to present "Attestations: a military mosaic of unexpected stories" for JCC Chicago in mid-April. The American process for accessing military records is different from the Canadian one, so there was substantial interest in the range and amount of information we

have been able to include in our Southern Alberta Jewish Veterans of World War I & II database. This presentation, a slight revision of our 2017 Remembrance Day program, can be viewed on our website, jhssa.org, under the Publications / Videos tab.

We were very excited by the local community's response to our Canadian Jewish Heritage Month project, the History Mystery Box. Interested parties signed up to receive a free box containing 11 mystery history items, copies of documents or photos — including photos of artifacts — from the IHSSA archives. Each box included questions and open-ended prompts for examining and responding to the material, along with a sealed envelope containing factual information about each item. Participants received their box, spent some time engaging with it either individually or in a group (respecting all relevant COVID restrictions), and then sent their responses back to JHSSA. We plan to feature some of the responses in

future issues of our journal, *Discovery*, and possibly in a future JHSSA program.


Planning is underway for this summer's Historic Calgary Week presentation, and JHSSA is hoping to feature a reading by local author and JHSSA member Trudy Cowan. Cowan's children's book *Quarantine: Keep Out* is based on the use of the Montefiore homesteader's synagogue building as a hospital during the 1918 influenza pandemic. The tentative theme for the week is "History Unmasked, Zooming Back," which, if we can forgive the puns, sums up our hopes for the future.



### Max and Tessie Zelikovitz Centre for Jewish Studies at Carleton University, Ottawa

As noted in the autumn ACJS Bulletin, COVID-19 encouraged the ZC to increase its collaboration with other institutions. The ZC and the Vered Jewish Canadian Studies Program at the University of Ottawa partnered on several programs in the winter semester.

The ZC will also be working with Gratz College on behalf of Carleton University. This past December, Carleton University signed a Memorandum



(MOU) Understanding (https://carleton.ca/ Gratz College jewishstudies/2020/mazel-tov-on-thesigning-of-the-mou-between-gratzcollege-and-carleton-university/). Jacques Shore, donor and a past chair of Carleton University's board of governors and its executive committee, spoke about his mother's relationship with Gratz College. As founder and director of the Lena Allen-Shore Center in Philadelphia, she taught there for more than thirty years. Shore noted, "Today's MOU gives Gratz, a leader in university e-learning, and Carleton an unbelievable opportunity to work together and to engage students and faculty around the world."

While CHES and the ZC will continue to collaborate on a variety of Holocaust education programs, CHES (as of February 2021) is now operating independently of the ZC. It intends, as a registered charity, to expand its programming capabilities (<a href="https://carleton.ca/jewishstudies/zcches/">https://carleton.ca/jewishstudies/zcches/</a>).

Holocaust and antisemitism scholarship are central to the ZC's mission, and the ZC will continue to provide leadership in Holocaust scholarship and education through a variety of programs and initiatives on campus and in the broader community. For International Holocaust Remembrance Day (January 27), the ZC hosted a panel discussion on the documentary Glass Negatives, directed by Jan Borowiec. The theme of the panel discussion was "Lost Memory, Forgotten Lessons? Holocaust Education & the Challenge of Antisemitism Today." Co-sponsors with the ZC were Hillel Ottawa, the Vered Jewish Canadian Studies Program, and the Embassy of Israel in Canada.

In February, Zelikovitz affiliate Dr. Rohee Dasgupta spoke on "Cosmopolitics and Holocaust Education" and the importance of teaching the Holocaust in multicultural societies. On a lighter note, Professor Allan Moscovitch, a member of the Advisory Board of the ZC, shared his love of music through his talk on Jewish contributions to popular music in the 20th century: <a href="https://carleton.ca/jewishstudies/events/2021-events/#2021AllanMoscovitch">https://carleton.ca/jewishstudies/events/2021-events/#2021AllanMoscovitch</a>.

As part of Black History Month, the movie *Shared Legacies* was aired, followed by a panel discussion: <a href="https://carleton.ca/jewishstudies/events/2021-events/#2021SharedLegacies">https://carleton.ca/jewishstudies/events/2021-events/#2021SharedLegacies</a>. Hosted by the ZC, this event was co-sponsored by the Department of History at Carleton, Temple Israel, and the Embassy of the United States.

In March, Dr. Mary Jane Ainslie, Associate Professor in Media and Communication, University of Nottingham Ningbo China, spoke on "Challenging Antisemitism in Contemporary Malaysia: Countering Malay nationalist forces through pro-Israel expressions."

Earlier in the year, the ZC applied for funding to develop an online course. "Hear Our Voices: Holocaust Survivors Share their Stories of Trauma and Hate" is a bilingual online course that places the voices of Holocaust survivors at the centre of learning about the Holocaust and antisemitism. Four modules empower educators to engage survivor voices through videorecorded oral histories. Collectively and individually, they enable educators from multiple disciplines to apply their own questions and methods to this powerful material. Educators will facilitate cogent explorations of historical experiences of the Holocaust and antisemitism, providing students with tools for reflecting on larger questions of prejudice and hate. Scaffolded modules target key tools to think about this history through an EDDI lens: 1) "Survivor Testimony" examines the uses of survivor testimony; 2) "Gender & Sexuality" explores the depiction of gender and sexuality during the Holocaust; 3) "Religion & Culture" explores Jewish, Christian, and Muslim responses during and after the war; and 4) "Antisemitism & Race" analyzes survivor stories, employing antisemitism as a challenging and complex example of religious, racial, and ethnic hatred.

In April, Emanuel Rosen, author of If Anyone Calls, Tell Them I Died, spoke about his book, which describes his search for why his grandfather (a well-known lawyer in Hamm, Germany, prior to 1933) killed himself in 1957 after returning from a visit to Germany. Also in April, the ZC is hosting its annual graduate student colloquium with the Vered Jewish Canadian Studies program, and Religion at Carleton University (https://carleton.ca/jewishstudies/).

Looking towards the fall, the ZC is in discussion with the Azrieli Foundation to work together on a book launch in November for Ottawa's Holocaust Education Month of *Escape from the Edge*, a Holocaust Survivor story by Dr Morris Schnitzer z"l: (https://memoirs.azrielifoundation.org/titles/escape-from-the-edge/).

Ottawa to bring Canadian authors to Virginia via a Zoom webinar format during the month of March.

The webinar series kicked off with the poet and renowned translator of Yiddish authors into French, Chantal Ringuet, who spoke on March 1. Ringuet talked about all the trajectories of her work (her poetry, her translations of the Yiddish poet Rachel Korn, her collaborative works about Jewish Montreal, her discovery of a hidden manuscript by Chagall, and most recently her books on Leonard Cohen). Ringuet also spoke about growing up in Quebec City without much exposure to Jews or Judaism and how she fell in love with Yiddish and Jewish culture.

Natalia Vesselova of the Vered Institute joined Dr. Peter Schulman in a stimulating conversation with Ringuet about her life and work.

Later, at 7:30 p.m., acclaimed poet Lisa Richter joined Dr. Schulman for an in-depth discussion about Richter's recent poetry volume centered around Yiddish poet Ana Margolin, *Nautilus and Bone* (Frontenac House, 2020), the winner of the 2020 National Jewish Book Award for poetry.

They talked about Richter's spiritual connections to Margolin, the Lower East Side of Manhattan, Margolin's free spirit, political engagement and fiery loves and marriages. Richter also explained her unique writing technique as she read moving passages from her work.

The series concluded on March 24 with author Melanie Loisel, a former Radio-Canada reporter and respected journalist who, in a moderated conversation with Dr. Hernan Tesler-Mabé, spoke about her astonishing book about and with Holocaust survivor Martin Gray (*Ma vie en partage*, Editions de l'Aube, 2016).

She spoke about her mission to preserve memories and the witnesses of history for future generations before their stories disappear forever as well as her interviews with extraordinary Holocaust survivors and heroes in her book *Ils ont vécu leur siècle* (Editions de l'Aube, 2015). Her books are all in Yad Vashem as a testament to her commitment to Jewish memory.

The series was a great success and succeeded in attracting a varied and engaged audience from among university professors, writers, students and everyday people from both Canada and the United States. We can only hope this lovely marriage of ideas will continue next year as well with new projects and events.



Saint John Jewish Historical Museum By Katherine Biggs-Craft

Several research projects are underway at the Saint John Jewish Historical Museum and will be ready to view virtually or in person as the year progresses. The pandemic seems to have inspired a number of projects and enabled us to find new ways to share the history of the Saint John Jewish community.

### 1. The View from Damascus Gate: Travels in Israel, 1855-2017

The inspiration for the exhibit for 2021-2022 came from photographs taken in the Holy Land in 1860 by Rev. William Mead Jones, a missionary who lived there from 1856 to 1860. His experiences there were preserved in his journal and the voluminous correspondence that has survived. This will be accompanied by stories and photographs from more than a dozen Museum members of travels taken during the past 50 years. Our display cases will be filled with treasures from our collections, including our small collection of 2500-year-old archaeological artifacts. This exhibit has been made possible with funding from the Exhibition Renewal and Museum Activities Support Program, Archaeology and Heritage Branch, Province of New Brunswick.

### 2. Saint John Jewish Family Tree

Saint John was home to 200-300 Jewish families between the 1920s and the 1960s. Most families can count from three to as many as seven generations in the city, and many of the families are related by blood and marriage. Family stories will be collected, written and illustrated, to be shared on a blog. It will take some time to tell all the family stories, and followers of the blog will watch the site build as stories are added. This digital project has been made possible with funding from the Exhibition Renewal and Museum Activities Support Program (Digital World and Social Media), Archaeology and Heritage Branch, Province of New Brunswick.

### 3. Following Their Footsteps: Finding Former Jewish Homes and Shops

There are more than thirty buildings within walking distance of our museum that were homes and businesses for members of the Saint John Jewish community. The proximity of the buildings lends itself to the creation of guided and self-guided mini walking tours that can take interested visitors along a block or two of a residential or commercial street. Each stop will include notes about the building's architecture, ownership and Jewish connections. The walking tour will be launched in the late spring of 2021. Funding to support this project was from the Saint John Community Arts Board.

### 4. Every Stone Tells A Story

This project complements the "Following Their Footsteps" project by creating tours of the Shaarei Zedek Cemetery. Ove the past 20 years, the Museum has gathered information on each of the interments, including dates, obituaries and family relationships. Photographs have been taken of each gravestone. All of this information along with other archival material will be woven together to create a series of walks through the grounds to follow a

number of different themes and family relationships. Walking guides of the cemetery should be complete in early 2022. Funding to support this project is from the Saint John Community Arts Board.

### 5. Open For Business

With funding from a grant through Digital Museums Canada, we have updated our exhibit "Open for Business" as a Community Stories project. The exhibit has been divided into 17 small chapters, accompanied by archival photographs and documents to recall the days when there were as many as 85 Jewish stores in operation in Saint John.

We anticipate the story will be launched in early December 2021 and will be part of the Digital Museums Canada website.

### 6. Yahrzeit Biographies Project

There are more than 600 names engraved on yahrzeit plaques in the Shaarei Zedek Synagogue. As time has passed and memories begin to fade, it was decided to write short biographies to accompany each name to remind the congregation of the personal history and family ties for each name.

This project has truly resonated with community members in Saint John and around the world, many of whom have come forward with additional information about individuals and families.

### 7. Oral History Project

Early in the Museum's history, our founding curator, Marcia Koven, conducted about 40 oral interviews with elderly community members, recording

many aspects of the community's early history. Over the past couple of years, we have picked up this project and started interviewing community members using a video camera. We have also been able to reconnect with many people using Zoom and have discovered that this is also a useful medium for doing oral history and have completed several Zoom recordings with former community members. It is very exciting to be able to reach across the country to share memories of the community that was so important to their

was so important to their youth.

Links to many of the projects above will be shared on the Saint John Jewish Historical Museum's webpage and Facebook page as each is completed.

We are opening our doors for a live in-person and via Zoom event – **Judaism in Context Lecture Series, Part II** – on April 18 and 25 and May 2. These lectures will

be presented by Dan Elman on three Sunday afternoons, exploring Judaism in the context of world religions and history. In each two-hour session, Dan will discuss the topic in an informative and interesting manner and will then open the floor to questions and comments.

- April 18, 2021 When Religion Goes Wrong / Conversations reveal our cultural history (words are often houses for similar ideas)
- April 25,2021 An Evolution Towards Today: The Axial Age, Mysticism, Polytheism and Monotheism
- May 2, 2021 The Eternal Triangle / From Moses to Plato to Jung

Dan Elman studied at the University New Brunswick, Fredericton; Dalhousie University, Halifax; the University of Fribourg, Switzerland; the Catholic University of Louvain, Belgium; and the Jungian Institute, Zurich, Switzerland. He served as president of Congregation Shaarei Zedek from 1983-1984. In the absence of a rabbi, he was the community's lay reader for nearly two decades, leading Sabbath services, teaching children for Bar/Bat Mitzvahs and conducting community outreach about Judaism to community, church and school groups. More recently he has served as a coordinator for the community's Immigration Committee, which has been working since 2004 to rebuild the Jewish population of Saint

John. Dan Elman has also made a name for himself as a champion chess player and instructor and was instrumental in bringing the World Chess Festival to Saint John in 1988. His writings include Centrum (a novel), Enixam (poetry), Evolution of Chess Concepts, A Program for Scholastic Chess and A Collection of Thoughts (based on weekly Sabbath portions).

The Saint John Jewish Historical Museum will be open for the summer tourism season from Monday, June 14, to Friday, October 8, with regular hours from Monday to Friday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and the addition of Sunday hours of 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. during July and August.



For starters, we've incorporated short breaks after every session, where attendees can grab some snacks or prepare for the next session. We'll keep the sessions open during those breaks, though, in case attendees would like to schmooze a bit.

We've also expanded our days a bit with more content, so attendees can take an à-la-carte approach: You may not be able to attend every session, but now there are more sessions to choose from, with a greater variety. Maybe I'm just nerding out, but I'm really excited about our sessions this year. We have a mix of our typical conference style and some that are slightly different. On our first day, we have a session that looks at Canadian Jewish community concerns, followed by one on the question of keeping kosher in the interwar years. Our first atypical session will be a joint one between the ACJS and the Latin American Jewish Studies Association (again, the online nature of this year's conference has afforded us this great opportunity). Following a Jews and Language session and a break, we will present this year's welldeserved Rosenberg award to Frank Bialystok and host a roundtable discussion on Jewish choirs in a pandemic

On our second day, the annual board meeting will be followed by a session on advocacy and activism. During the lunch hour, Richard Menkis will host a live episode of "Meet the Author," the ACJS interview series that he and I have been working on since last year's conference was cancelled. Following this, we have two sessions—chronologically organized—about World War II and the Holocaust, as well as survivor life after the Holocaust. Finally, we will be hosting our first ACJS Movie Night in the early evening, with a focus on Jews of colour.

On our final day, we will start with our annual general meeting, followed by a really interesting session that features individual stories of interest in Canadian Jewish studies. During our lunch hour, we'll have an open schmooze session. Closing out the conference, we have two sessions in the afternoon: one on Canadian Jewish popular culture and one about Canada's Jews fitting into a variety of communities.

So as you can see, we have a full docket this year, with plenty of really interesting sessions to choose from. We are keeping most of the conference closed to members except for the special events. If folks from the community would like to attend, we would encourage them to pay the low cost for a membership to gain access to everything.

Finally, I'd like to reemphasize how wonderful it would be to have as many of our members and colleagues hop on, even if only for a few sessions. Given the low cost and convenience, we think it's a great opportunity for some much-needed community! I, for one, am really looking forward to it, and I'm very excited to meet back up with my colleagues.

### SAINT JOHN, NEW BRUNSWICK

Rabbi Abraham Babb (1898-1976) served as a teacher and spiritual leader for the Saint John Jewish community for more than 25 years, beginning in 1921. He had been ordained a rabbi in 1920. He came to Saint John from

Poland as a visitor and was encouraged to stay as a Hebrew teacher. In the years that followed, he taught many children, some of them throughout their entire religious education. He led weekly Sabbath services and became involved in every aspect of community life. He took on leadership roles with Saint John Young Judaea and Judaean

Boy Scouts and was extensively involved with Zionist Order Habonim.

In the 1920s and 1930s, he served as a Port Chaplain, where he used his ability to speak as many as nine languages to welcome

and assist immigrants communicate with officials and make travel arrangements. Rabbi Babb organized the Maritime Region of the Canadian Jewish Congress and helped set up a Jewish Service Centre in 1944. During the Second World War he was a flight lieutenant in the Royal Canadian Air Force and served as the Jewish chaplain for the Atlantic provinces. He was highly regarded for his extensive and knowledge scholarly sermons. There was deep regret in the community when he left in 1947 to lead congregations in Ontario, first in Belleville, then in Peterborough, where he was highly

Goldman (1884-1971),Minnie originally from New York, married Joseph Goldman in 1901. In 1908 they moved to Saint John and opened a dry goods store on Wall Street. She was elected president of the Daughters of Israel in 1920 and again served from 1934-1939, after which

praised by his congregation.

she became honourary president. She was a member of the Local Council of



Women, becoming a vice-president in 1935 and serving until being elected president from 1949-1952. She was the first Jewish woman in the country to be elected as a local vice-president and provincial vice-president (1941) of the Council of Women. Near the end of the First World War, she became the local organizer for the Mogen David Odom organization, which served Jewish needs in Palestine with goals similar to those of the Red Cross.
