





SPEAKER BIOS/ À PROPOS DES CONFÉRENCIERS

Zachary M. Baker is the Reinhard Family Curator Emeritus of Judaica and Hebraica Collections in the Stanford University Libraries, where he served from 1999 to 2018. Prior to coming to Stanford, he was Head Librarian of the YIVO Institute for Jewish Research (1987-1999), Head of the Yiddish Department and Technical Services of the Jewish Public Library of Montreal (1981-1987), and a Yiddish cataloger in the YIVO Library (1976-1981). His articles on Judaica bibliography and Yiddish culture have appeared in numerous publications, including the Association for *Canadian Jewish Studies* Journal.

Noa Vigny Billick is a Jewish book artist and PhD student in the Communication and Culture program at Toronto Metropolitan University. Her research explores Jewish storytelling, communication, and the symbolic power of books as tools for cultural preservation and identity formation. Through her art and academic research, Noa emphasizes the interconnectedness of personal stories and cultural archives, reshaping understandings of Jewish identity and the narrative tradition.

Miriam Borden is a doctoral candidate at the University of Toronto and a Lecturer at University of California Berkeley in the Department of German, specializing in Yiddish literature and culture. She teaches courses on Yiddish language, literature, and history and has published on post-Holocaust Yiddish education in Toronto.

Deidre Butler, PhD, is an Associate Professor of Jewish Studies in the Religion program at Carleton University and Director of the Zelikovitz Centre for Jewish Studies. Butler is lead researcher of the Hear Our Voices project which centres oral history within the study of the Holocaust. Her research focuses on Jewish divorce in Canada and antisemitism on Canadian campuses. She is an ISGAP Fellow and is co-founder of (NECA).


Melissa Castron has been working as the Archives Technician at the Alex Dworkin Canadian Jewish Archives since 2022, following almost 10 years of research contracts that kept bringing her back in to visit the collections. She holds a graduate degree in History with a specialization in Archival Studies from the University of Manitoba (Winnipeg), and undergraduate degrees in art history and history from Concordia University (Montreal).

Melany Chaquin is a Jewish high-school teacher, writer, and editor. She notes: "I have been adamant about fighting antisemitism in Canada (especially within the field of education) for a number of years. I believe in teaching co-existence and in building bridges, and maintain that research and education are some of the surest ways to advance a society into one that is more united, less divisive, and overall safer for everyone. As a Canadian citizen who immigrated as a Jewish teenager from Argentina many years ago with no knowledge of English, I am passionate about immigration studies as well as about Jewish studies."

Jessica Taylor Charland is a PhD student in the department of Curriculum, Teaching and Learning at OISE with an interest in how teachers' cultural identities influence their pedagogy and classroom practices. She has been a teacher educator for the last decade helping preservice teachers learn about literacy instruction, infusing her knowledge of multimodal literacies and social justice advocacy into her practice. She is the proud mom of two kids, an avid reader, and art enthusiast.

Elliot Fonarev is a PhD candidate at the University of Toronto in the Department of Sociology, with a collaborative specialization at the Anne Tenenbaum Centre for Jewish Studies. The author is also a Research Fellow at the Lab for the Global Study of Antisemitism at the University of Toronto.

Valentina Gaddi is a doctoral student in Sociology at Université de Montréal (ABD). Her thesis explores the construction of gender among Hasidic Jewish women in Montréal, based on a three-years ethnography. More broadly, her academic wonders focus on the place of pious citizens in democratic societies. Her work received the support of the CRSH (Vanier scholar 2017-2020, Irtg-Diversity scholar 2020-2023). She is the co-creator of the Podcast Ma-Nishtana and the coordinator of the Collectif Judéité(s) at Université de Montréal. Valentina is also the French language associate editor of the Canadian Jewish Studies Journal/Journal d'études juives canadiennes.



Karen Halliday is a librarian at Georgian College in Barrie, Ontario. Karen's work with design and visual arts programs has prompted exploration into the Nazi-looted cultural property in Canada. Karen has received two grants from the college to research Nazi-looted books and Judaica in Canada. Karen is writing an article on Nazi-looted books in Canada for Judaica Librarianship journal. She has been awarded a Teaching Excellence Award and an Award of Excellence for Collaborative Teamwork.

Megan Hollinger is a doctoral candidate in Religious Studies at the University of Ottawa, researching social and community strategies for combating antisemitism in Canada. Megan teaches about the Holocaust at Carleton University and about antisemitism and Canadian Jewry at the University of Ottawa. Megan graduated as a Scholar-In-Residence from the ISGAP Oxford Summer Institute for the Development of Curriculum in Critical Antisemitism Studies and as a member of their research collective is engaged in mapping and understanding contemporary antisemitism from a scholarly perspective. Megan was also an Ian Stewart Graduate Fellow at the University of Victoria's Centre for Studies in Religion and Society in 2023. She is the Treasurer and Membership Chair of the Association for Canadian Jewish Studies.

David Koffman is the J. Richard Shiff Chair for the Study of Canadian Jewry, and an associate professor in the Department of History at York University. He is the author of The Jews' Indian: Colonialism, Pluralism, and Belonging in America, the editor of No Better Home? Jews, Canada, and the Sense of Belonging, and the co-editor of Promised Lands North and South: Jewish Canada and Jewish Argentina in Conversation. He serves as the associate director of York's Israel & Golda Koschitzky Centre for Jewish Studies, and the editor-in-chief of the journal *Canadian Jewish Studies / Études juives canadiennes*.


Betina Appel Kuzmarov, LLM, PhD is an Associate Professor in the Department of Law and Legal Studies at Carleton University, and Associate Vice-President (International). She is an interdisciplinary researcher in legal studies. She researches at the intersections of law and religion and international law and legal theory. She has published in the areas of international law and law and religion, including her book Unilateral Acts: History of a Legal Doctrine (Routledge: 2020).

Orah Liss is a PhD student for Canadian Literature at the University of Ottawa, Canada. A German native, she completed her undergraduate and postgraduate studies in Scotland, completing an MLitt thesis on trauma in Japanese Canadian and Indigenous Canadian literature. Her PhD project examines four modern Canadian Jewish women writers' engagement with exile and diaspora, balancing a literary home grounded in traditional Jewish literatures and a physical home grounded in their contemporary Canadian context.

Richard Menkis is in the Department of History at UBC. He recently published, with Pierre Anctil, 'In a Land of Hope': Documents on the Canadian Jewish Experience, 1627-1923. He has edited a collection of essays of Gerald Tulchinsky, with a historiographic introduction, currently under review at the University of Toronto Press. He is currently working with Anctil on volume two of In a Land of Hope, to appear in 2027.

Maya Pasternak is the Director of Archives at the Jewish Public Library, Montreal. With a background in art and social practice, she has curated international archival exhibitions for the Sydney Biennale (Australia), the Kunstverein (Amsterdam), Badischer Kunstverein (Karlsruhe, Germany), La Filature (Mulhouse, France), Jerusalem Film Festival (Israel), and more. She previously ran the archives of the Center for Digital Art (Holon, Israel), the Center of Contemporary Art (Tel Aviv, Israel), and the Noa Eshkol Foundation for Movement Notation (Holon, Israel). With a Masters of Information from the University of Toronto in Archiving and User Experience Design, she cares passionately about the care and access of archival materials.

Michael Rosen, R.P.F., Cert. Arb. is an Adjunct Professor and the University of British Columbia and a former President of Tree Canada, a national tree-planting charity. He notes: "I am one of the few Jewish Registered Professional Foresters in Canada."



Irving Rosen - Born and educated in Toronto, Irving Rosen received MD IN 1954 and retain an academic position at the Temerty School of Medicine of the University of Toronto but am fully retired from practice. He presently devotes his time to history of medicine research and meetings related to that field.

Romy Shoam (she/her) is a M.A. Public History student at Carleton University. Her research background and work in heritage include projects related to immigration history, social and gender history, and language and nationalism in Canada. Her M.A. research focuses on oral histories of French-speaking Jewish immigrants to Quebec in the mid-20th century.

Anna Sheftel is Principal and Associate Professor in the School of Community and Public Affairs at Concordia University. She has worked with Holocaust survivors in Montreal since 2008. She has published extensively on oral history practice and ethics, for example her article, "Talking and Not Talking about Violence: Challenges in Interviewing Survivors of Atrocity as Whole People," which won the OHA's 2019 Article Award.

Jonathan Slater is professor emeritus of public relations at the State University of New York at Plattsburgh, where he also directed the Institute for Ethics in Public Life and founded and led the institution's Jewish Studies Program. Dr. Slater currently serves on the board of the Marshall McLuhan Initiative in Winnipeg. He is the host of Tête-à-tête: Conversations in Canadian Jewish Studies – the official podcast of the ACJS journal, Canadian Jewish Studies/Études juives canadiennes.

Frederic Strack is a Postdoctoral Researcher at the Université de Sherbrooke. He works on the public management of religious diversity based on the case of Orthodox Jews. His current investigation, supported by the Fonds de Recherche du Québec, is about Hassidic Jews in Montreal. He recently published « Laïcité, Public Governance of Religion, and the Orthodox Jews in France », in Vekovic, M., Jevtic, M. (eds.), Religion and Politics in Europe, the USA and Asia, Routledge

Jacqueline Snidman-Stren is an undergraduate student studying Judaic Studies and Law & Society at Concordia University in Montreal, Canada. She is a 2024-2025 CAMERA on Campus Fellow, VP of Social Events and Marketing of Chabad Concordia, and VP Recruitment of Alpha Epsilon Phi. She has worked and volunteered with numerous Jewish organizations for countless establishments in order to give back to the Jewish community.

Joshua Tapper is a doctoral candidate in Jewish History at Stanford University, where he is completing a dissertation on the renaissance of Jewish culture and politics in the last years of the Soviet Union. He is vice president of the Association of Canadian Jewish Studies and managing editor of the journal Canadian Jewish Studies, which has published his work on Soviet Jewish immigration to and resettlement in Canada.

Hernan Tesler-Mabé is Associate Professor and Coordinator of the Jewish Studies program at Huron University in London, Ontario. His research centers on modern Jewish history and culture across the Diaspora, with a focus on the intersection of Jewish culture and identity. Dr. Tesler-Mabé is Past President of the Association for Canadian Jewish Studies (ACJS).

Benya Villani (they/them) is a PhD candidate at the University of Western Ontario, and the Research Manager at the Museum of Jewish Montreal. Their areas of focus is Jewish history in Europe and Canada during the early and mid-20th century. The subject of their doctoral research is Jewish identity during the post-World War II Displaced Persons crisis.

Ariel Waller is a graduate student in anthropology at the University of Ottawa currently working on a master's thesis on Jewish communities in small-town Ontario. She notes: "I grew up in Fergus, Ontario when it was only known for the Scottish Festival and Highland Games, and where my fondest memories are playing in cornfields and exploring the Grand River caves. I have always had a love for understanding how other people see the world; anthropology suits me well."
